Environmental Services Protecting You and the Environment

A diligent team of Environmental Services employees work tirelessly to maintain a clean and healthy living environment in Auburn, and the amount of garbage that is disposed and recycled is staggering. In 2009, Environmental Services employees removed 10,000 plus tons of household garbage and processed over 1,100 tons of recyclables. Environmental Services staff proactively administers education and outreach programs that teach citizens how they can recycle and keep Auburn beautiful. This past summer, the City hosted a hazardous waste recycling day, dedicated a week for residents to recycle excess garbage and yard debris, and taught every Auburn fifth grader in the City about recycling.



A part of the Loveliest Village's town charm can be attributed to swept streets, clean public right-of-ways, and managed vegetation along the City's numerous roads and streets, all maintained by Environmental Services employees. Through the Keep Auburn Beautiful outreach, the department partners with the Auburn Beautification Council, Auburn University and the Auburn Chamber of Commerce in an effort to encourage citizens to keep our community clean.

Access to recycling in Auburn is closer than you may think. This past spring, Environmental Services placed recycling bins at strategic locations downtown where patrons may recycle plastic bottles, aluminum cans, and newspapers. Last November, Governor Riley used the City's recycling drop-off center, located at 365 N. Donahue Drive, as a backdrop to promote recycling across the state, saying via Twitter that "Alabama can and must encourage more recycling efforts like [Auburn's]." The drop-off center is available to every citizen in Auburn, and curbside bins are made available to citizens, free of charge, through state grant funding. All citizens are encouraged to participate in curbside recycling. The City does ask residents to do their part by separating materials into separate recycling bins. This keeps the operational costs low, making the City's recycling program financially feasible.

In addition to their collection and beautification efforts, the Environmental Services Department works closely with the Lee County Humane Society to maintain animal control in the City. Last year, the City rescued 1,609 animals and placed them in the care of the Lee County Humane Society. In an effort to look out for the safety of our children, students are taught about animal care and control each year through the Auburn Public Library and Auburn City Schools.



There's no better time to enjoy the outdoors than in the fall. As you appreciate Auburn outdoors this fall, remember that whether you're downtown after game day or walking the streets of your neighborhood, the City's Environmental Services department is working to keep Auburn beautiful.

City Makes Road Improvements

A number of infrastructure maintenance and improvement projects are currently underway in Auburn. The new traffic light at the corner of North College Street and Shelton Mill Road is now operational. As the October Open Line goes to press, active infrastructure projects include the Donahue Bridge Replacement Project, repaving on Glenn Avenue from Dean Road to East University Drive, the addition of a turn lane on East University Drive at Dekalb Avenue and intersection improvements at Shelton Mill Road and East University Drive.

In an effort to provide the maximum service possible for the taxpayer dollar, the City of Auburn has successfully supplemented local taxpayer funding in a number of ways. The traffic light at North College and Shelton Mill was partially funded by the Copper Beach Development. This private funding was required by the City as part of the development agreement with Copper Beach due to the traffic impact that development would have on this in-

tersection. The Donahue Bridge project is a joint effort between the City of Auburn and Lee County, benefiting both Auburn citizens and Lee County citizens who live outside of the Auburn City limits. Recent repaving on Glenn Avenue was funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

Another method the City employs to guard taxpayer dollars carefully is crack-sealing. You may have noticed the tell-tale signs of crack-seal, a hot-pour, petroleum-based pavement crack and joint sealant, on some Auburn streets. For some, crack-seal diminishes the appearance of the road. Some even misinterpret the visual appearance of crack-seal as a sign that the road needs work. The effect of crack-seal, however, is to prevent water from using existing cracks in the pavement to cause further road deterioration. City engineers have found that crack-sealing extends the useful life of pavement by at least four years. In the summer of 2010, Public Works crews performed crack-sealing on over 13 miles of local roadway. The materials cost for this work was barely over \$1,000, making crack-sealing a cost effective way to extend the life of our roadways.

Currently underway is a project to evaluate the condition of all of Auburn's roads. This project, in which roads are assigned grades based on their condition, is undertaken every two to three years, and is key in determining resurfacing priorities. Each year, the Auburn Public Works department coordinates crack-sealing, striping and resurfacing projects, prioritized by the results of road grading. Company officials expect the creation of 100 new jobs in Auburn over the next two years.

Viper Motorcycle Company, a subsidiary of Viper Powersports, produces high performance, super cruiser motorcycles for bike enthusiasts. The motorcycles are produced with over 80% of proprietary parts designed and manufactured by Viper.

State Representative Mike Hubbard and Governor Bob Riley assisted in recruiting the Company to Alabama. Governor Bob Riley congratulated Auburn on this exciting economic development news. "This is a great win for Auburn and really for our entire state. We're proud to welcome Alabama's latest economic development success to Alabama and look forward to a long and productive relationship with Viper. I know I'm definitely looking forward to seeing those bikes that will be built in Alabama out on the road," stated Governor Riley.

Developer To Build City's First Conservation Subdivision

Auburn home buyers will soon have a new kind of lifestyle housing to choose from; one that takes unprecedented steps to conserve the environment. The developer of Lundy Chase subdivision plans to build Phase III of Lundy Chase that will meet criteria necessary to be zoned as a "conservation subdivision," the City's newest zoning category. In this category, a minimum of 50% of the acreage must be left as open-space in perpetuity. In 2007, the Auburn City Council approved the new zoning category to protect the Lake Ogletree watershed on the City's south side, zoning the area as a conservation district. However, the zoning ordinance also allowed for a conservation district to be zoned anywhere in the City.

Current estimates show that Lundy Chase, West will include 12 acres of open space for walking trails and greenways, all planned to be constructed by the developer. According to the City's Planning Director, the open space is planned to be donated to the City and maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department. "This is a good project that balances the desires of the City, Developer, and surrounding neighborhood," said Forrest Cotten, the City's Planning Director. Community Development Block Grants Provide Affordable Homes in Auburn

Buying a home is a dream of many residents in Auburn. The construction of the new homes in the Northwest Village subdivision gives citizens an opportunity to make that dream a reality. On Thursday, August 5th, the Community Development Division of the City of Auburn commemorated the completion of five new affordable homes by presenting keys to new homeowners, Billy Jackson, Robin Williams, Lakeisha Thomas, and Serena Johnson.

The partnership between the City of Auburn and the North Auburn Housing Development Corporation has resulted in the completion of 14 homes since 2004. Auburn Mayor Bill Ham and Councilman Arthur Dowdell presented the keys to residents, and updated the public on the progress of Northwest Village. All homeowners who purchase homes through the Community Development Block Grant program meet Housing and Urban Development income requirements.



Hubbard Secures Funding for Duck Samford Stadium Improvements

Auburn High School athletics have room for even more supporters now that 2,500 new seats are available at Duck Samford Stadium, bringing the total seating to 8,310. State Representative Mike Hubbard secured \$705,000 for new bleachers, new restrooms and a new scoreboard at the stadium. The grant for the funds was awarded through the Public School and College Authority. The expanded stadium facilitates extracurricular activities involving high school football, soccer, band, dance, and cheerleading.

Auburn City Schools will recognize Hubbard at the first Auburn High School home football game to be held at Duck Samford; Auburn High vs. Enterprise on September 10, 2010. Hubbard is a long-time resident and friend of the City of Auburn. His interest in Auburn City Schools is evident in past grants he has secured through state appropriations. Hubbard secured a grant to fund the digital marquee in front of Auburn High School, has secured money to fund telecommunication suites for each school, and secures appropriations for fourth grade students to attend the legislature in Montgomery each year.

In celebration of the state's small towns and downtowns, the City of Auburn will be hosting a series of events to celebrate our rich heritage, diverse business community and southern charm. A speaker series kicked off in August and will continue through November. 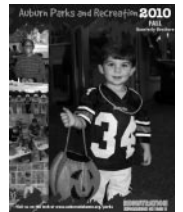
